Speak and Listen

- Use and understand many words
- Speak in complete sentences
- Ask lots of questions
- Say and notice words that rhyme in stories
- Make up and share personal stories about his or her interests

Read and Write

- Select familiar books and tell why he or she likes them. Retell favorite stories from books
- Hold a book upright.
- · Identify letters of the alphabet
- Recognize letter sounds
- Recognize, copy and print his or her first name
- Hold a pencil and write with it.

Kindergarten Readiness Suggestions

Before your child enters school, he or she should be able to:

Use Mathematics

- Recognize and count up to ten items
- Recognize the number symbols 1-10
- Describe and talk about objects that have different sizes, colors, shapes and patterns
- · Sort items by "same" and "different"
- Use the words "near", "far" "top", "bottom", "under", "first", "second", "last"
- Sort objects from smallest to largest, shortest to tallest and lightest to heaviest.

Participate and Cooperate

- Understand and participate in conversations
- Stay and involved in a directed activity to its completion
- Follow routines and directions
- Work and play together with other children
